## Presidential Search Update:

We look forward to working with Storbeck Search and have full confidence in the firm's ability to represent our campus constituents in attracting the most qualified pool of candidates for the position of Buffalo State's 10th president. In addition, the nomination and voting process to elect full-time teaching faculty for the presidential search committee is underway and will conclude on Friday. After approval of the entire committee by the Chancellor, and we confirm the individual candidates' willingness to serve, the presidential search committee will be announced to the Buffalo State community in The Daily Bulletin and will be published on the presidential search website. Ms. Dobmeier thanked Vice President Jim Finnerty and the Foundation for their assistance in the process.

# Divisional Highlights for the President's Report to the College Council February 7, 2023

#### PRESIDENT'S INTRODUCTION

With the College Council's endorsement, on January 15, 2023, the institution's official New York State Education Department title changed from State University College at Buffalo to SUNY Buffalo State University! Just last year, we celebrated our sesquicentennial and the richness of our institution's history. This name change does not change who we are, instead it is a recognition by the State Education Department of who we have become. It is merely an acknowledgment that the Buffalo Normal School on the corner of 13<sup>th</sup> and Jersey Avenues, founded in 1871, has evolved throughout these 151 years into an institution that offers 79 baccalaureate degrees, 64 masters degrees, and several certificate programs across various academic disciplines on an ever expanding campus on Elmwood Ave. As we look to the future, embracing the university designation is one of the many ways in which Buffalo State is aligning with the changing landscape of higher education and will become more competitive as a result.

The following report contains highlights from the various administrations divisions since our last meeting on November 15, 2022.

#### **ACADEMIC AFFAIRS DIVISIONAL HIGHLIGHTS**

#### School of Arts and Sciences

- The Theater Department's Costume Shop Manager Erica Fire completed a Sewing Machine Repair Technician Certification and will now maintain the 100+ commercial sewing machines on campus saving almost \$12k per year.
- John Torrey has been named to the New York State "400 Years of African American History" commission.
- Social Studies Education Major and one of the captains of Buffalo State's Football team, Michael Drywa was selected to play in the Senior Bowl in Middletown, NY. He was Buffalo State's leading tackler this year and this is a high honor.
- Theater, Music and TFA programs are teaming up with Residence Life to offer "The Studio" beginning in Fall 23. This is a housing community for students from all three majors on the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> floor suites of Tower 1. Exciting opportunities for both incoming first-year and returning students that will assist in recruitment and retention efforts.

- Joe Cleary's publication, "A Suburban Funeral", was selected to receive the 2023 International
  Association of Autoethnography and Narrative Inquiry's 'Honorable Mention, Outstanding Journal
  Article Award'.
- Kim Chinquee has published her eighth book and first novel, *Pipette*, from Ravenna Press. A review in IndieReader calls it "a gem of a book."

#### **School of Education**

- Education Pathways Program: The Erie I BOCES teaching careers high school program has been hugely successful. Faculty from the Teacher Education Unit have presented in the class. The students attended field experiences in a PDS school and were hosted by Kevin Williams in the Planetarium. The students in the program also served as ambassadors for the program in their respective districts where a new cohort is being recruited for the fall. This spring semester's college credits will be in EXE 100, SPF 202/353 and CWP 102. Enrollments will be made by the Office of Continuing and Professional Studies who will manage tuition for the program.
- Teacher Opportunity Corps II (My Brother's Keeper): New cohorts of candidates in both the Urban Teacher Academy and the Buffalo Urban Teacher Pipeline Residency Program BUTPRP have been recruited and are enrolled. The new site for UTA is the International Preparatory Academy (IPREP). McKinley High School has experienced many challenges this year. A new liaison to the program, Ms. Susanna Schenck, Lecturer in EELEL fulfills the role left vacant with the passing of Dr. Theresa Harris-Tigg who was the original program liaison with the campus. Dr. Kathy Wood, Associate Dean for Recruitment and Teacher Diversity, manages all of these high productivity recruitment activities with expert assistance from Keisha Brandy, Dr. Sandra Washington-Copland and Dr. Hilary Lochte, Assistant Professor, English.
- Woods Beals Endowed Chair: Dr. Jevon Hunter will return fully to his role as the Woods Beals Chair.
- PDS: Once again, the graduate assistants and PDS student representatives (reps) who prepared
  research proposals for the National Association of Professional Development Schools (NAPDS)
  conference will travel there with several SOE faculty (and the dean who is presenting a roundtable
  discussion on meeting teacher shortages) in March 2023 in Jacksonville, Florida. The students have
  an eclectic mix of research topics that will likely attract many attendees to their presentations.
- IPDS: The international program associated with PDS was officially named the Michael and Nancy Chicola International Professional Development Schools Consortium in October. Teacher candidates from across the Buffalo State Teacher Education Unit will be returning from their highly successful short-term, faculty-led, study away trip in January of 2023. A group in Torremaggiore, Italy was featured on the Italian news as an extraordinary partnership. A second trip in Cabarete, Dominican Republic has also returned. The Experienced Educator Exchange will send professional teachers from our PDS schools to Medellín, Colombia in February. https://pds.buffalostate.edu/international-pds.

WNY Teacher Preparation Committee of Erie I BOCES: Dean Paterson continues to work with this
group of P-12 educators and colleagues from UB, Canisius and Niagara University to address
common areas of need in the WNY schools including teacher shortages and diversity in the teacher
education workforce. Residency program funds offered by the Governor's office will be brokered by
Erie I BOCES. Buffalo State's PDS Consortium will partner in this effort.

#### **School of Professions**

## Fashion & Textile Technology Department

- A team made up of three Buffalo State fashion and textile technology majors was among 10 teams that made the semifinals in the 2023 National Retail Federation (NRF) Foundation Student Challenge, which wrapped up at the end of 2022.
- The students—Madison Bryant-Wagstaff, Emelia Seiferth, and Angelina Deleon—were charged with developing a growth and launch strategy for Public Lands, a new outdoor specialty retail concept for Dick's Sporting Goods.
- BAM "Basquiat Meets Bergdorf Goodman" Fashion Show at Buffalo Art Movement will be held on February 18th, 2023, at 8PM. (Rescheduled from the last December). This is a fundraising community fashion show.
- "Upcycle Re-Imagined" on February 24 & 25, 2023 Two-day workshop on fashion upcycling that will be held in the FTT Design Studios from 10AM 4PM.
- "Re-Education and Decolonizing Fashion for Gen Z" on April 13, 2023, 7PM at the Jacqueline Vito LoRusso Alumni Visitor Center. The FTT department will host a guest speaker, Kimberly Jenkins who will talk about her decentralizing and decolonizing narratives in fashion history and contemporary fashion practices.
- "2023 Runway Fashion Show: Provoking Protopias" at the Buffalo State Sports Arena on April 22, 2023, at 2PM and 8PM.

#### Health, Nutrition, and Dietetics Department

 Elizabeth Hartz, MS, RDN, CDN just started a project to create diabetes and hypertension/heart disease nutrition education materials for the Tuscarora Nation's health center with a focus on traditional food ways and incorporating Tuscarora language.

#### **Hospitality & Tourism Department**

• The HTR Department was awarded \$30,000 by the Statler Foundation. Small scholarships were distributed to 20 Hospitality Students for Fall 2022 (\$15,000) and Spring (\$15,000).

## Speech-Language Pathology Department

Katrina Fulcher-Rood was asked to serve on the Executive Board of Directors for the ALS Association
of WNY and Chair for the Care Services Committee for the ALS Association of WNY. Starting in
January 2023, she will serve as an Editorial Board Member for the journal Language, Speech, and

Hearing Services in Schools. In addition, research by Fulcher-Rood, Castilla-Earls, & Higginbotham (2019) was cited in a recent New York Times op-ed titled A Language Test That Stigmatizes Black Children.

 On November 15<sup>th</sup>, Camilo Maldonado presented at the 2022 American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) Convention with two former SLP graduate students, Joy Oni and Carly Hynd. The presentation was titled "The Effects of Mentorship with an SLP of Color on Professional Readiness of Undergraduate Students". Kathleen McNerney and Sara Mann Kahris also presented a virtual poster titled "Incorporating Professional Issues into the Graduate Curriculum: There's a Badge for That!"

## **Engineering Technology Department**

- Saquib Ahmed submitted a pre-proposal to the Dept of Education, Office of Science, entitled, "2D MoTe2/Ti2CO2 vdW heterojunctions as a potential Z-scheme photocatalyst for water splitting,"
- Last spring, Joseph Wikar, a senior <u>engineering technology</u> major at Buffalo State, earned a
  prestigious paid internship at the <u>Center for Nanoscale Science and Technology</u> (CNST) within the
  National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST), one of the top national labs in the country.
  Joseph finished this Fellowship this past fall semester. This opportunity is only offered to two or
  three students from more than 100 of the top schools in the country.

## **Butler Library**

- Bengal Study Nights: Hundreds of students attended Bengal Study Nights activities held at the end of the fall semester to provide students with opportunities to get extra help and, just as importantly, to relax and socialize. The activities were organized and are the result of hard work put in by staff in the Math Center, Tutoring, Writing Center. Activities included final exam reviews, extended tutoring, library research support, relaxation activities, yoga, meditation, therapy dogs, games, free pizza and other goodies, prizes, and finals survival kits for the entire student body!
- Cecilia Bard Multicultural Library for Peace: Working with Project Flight co-founders, directors and Buffalo State Professors Dr. Geraldine Bard and Dr. Elizabeth Cappella, Butler Library was able to expand the "Cecilia Bard Multicultural Library for Peace" with the addition of over 500 donated titles. An additional related collection called the "Literacy Library Collection for Equity, Social Justice & Peace" was also created it includes over 100 books that serve to highlight the simple power of supporting equity, social justice and peace to help others thrive. The volumes comprising this collection are carefully selected to provide the college with a wide variety of juvenile and adult fiction and non-fiction titles focused on multiculturalism, social justice, equity, diversity and peace. Butler library is ever appreciative of the impactful and ongoing support from Dr.'s Bard and Cappella.
- Child Care Center Partnership: The Butler Library has been partnering with SUNY Buffalo State
   University's Child Care Center on Thursday mornings. The Center brings classes to the library every

week for story times and crafts. We are excited to be expanding childhood literacy, as well as ensuring that the children see that the University is a place where they are welcome.

- Diversity Audit of Library Collections: Butler Library gas started a pilot program conducting a
  diversity audit of the Curriculum Materials Lab collection, beginning with the picture books.

  Diversity audits measure the extent to which authors and characters of color are represented in our
  collection, and, thus, the extent to which our users can find themselves reflected in the collection.

  The picture-book audit is the first step in a new strategic initiative focused on conducting a diversity
  audit of the entire collection.
- New Math Center Initiatives: The Math Center piloted two new study groups for highly-enrolled course in which students often need tutoring support (MAT121 and MAT161). The Math Center also offered a Certification Exam Prep for the Content Specialty Test (CST) that many teaching candidates need to take for NYS Certification. Attendance for these new programs was brisk.
- **Trivia Nights**: Once monthly, the Butler Library has a Trivia Night for students in the evening. Many of the participants are residential students who are exited for another activity to attend in the evening. We use breaks between questions to discuss other campus activities and library resources.
- Windows Replacement Project: As part of ongoing efforts to improve library and academic
  commons spaces, the significant months-long project to replace all windows in the library was
  completed and disruptions to students using our spaces was minimized. The new windows are
  more environmentally friendly and help support campus sustainability goals. Most import
  importantly, this project will help create more welcoming and comfortable spaces in which our
  students can study, engage in group projects, and socialize.

#### **Civic and Community Engagement**

The Civic and Community Engagement Office continues to lead and advance Buffalo State's efforts as an urban-engaged anchor institution.

#### Community-Engaged Learning Unit

The community-engaged learning unit provides support to connect classroom learning with community priority.

- Fall 2022 Community Engaged Learning: 47 faculty offered 71 community-engaged/civic learning courses involving 694 students with 46community organizations in the fall 2022 semester
- Spring 2023 Community Engaged Learning: An estimated 47 faculty are offering 72 community-engaged/civic learning courses

#### Civic Engagement Unit

The civic engagement unit aims to provide out of class connections to social justice and civic action.

• The <u>self-assisted tax program</u> will run February 3-April 14, 2023 and connects low-income students and community members with tax assistance through a collaboration with the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance. Last year, 145 individuals were provided services to complete no-cost tax preparation.

- Voter engagement efforts resulted in 245 students being registered to vote in fall 2022. In addition, analysis of voter turnout indicated CCE voter engagement efforts are successfully resulting in increased student voter engagement. Specifically,
  - o Student voter registration rates increased from 63.8% in 2014 to 75.0% in 2020.
  - o The voting rate of registered student voters increased from 20% in 2014 to 68.3% in 2020.

## Community Academic Center

The Community Academic Center provides support for youth and families through enhanced educational opportunities.

- CAC received \$12,000 grant from Erie County for youth afterschool programming
- 40 youth and 38 Buffalo State students were involved in youth STEAM programming, teen leadership efforts, and adult citizenship classes.

#### West Side Promise Neighborhood

As a significant aspect of Buffalo State's mission as an anchor in our community, our role in WSPN continues to improve the lives of children and their families living on Buffalo's West Side.

- Through Buffalo State leadership, WSPN conducted holiday food security efforts, securing funds from United Healthcare and Rich's, as well as in-kind donations from numerous partners that resulted in thousands of pounds of food being provided to west side neighbors.
- The WSPN leadership program enrolled 30 community members in its change leadership program and celebrated the achievements of participants who completed the program.

## **Continuing And Professional Studies**

- Submitted a grant proposal as part of the NYS Dept of Labor Unemployed/Underemployed Worker
  Training Program in the amount of \$216,775. The grant would support wraparound services,
  training in Food Service, and opportunities to interview with local employers. The grant targets prerelease individuals. We have partnered with the Erie County Sheriff's Office, Peaceprints of WNY,
  The Buffalo Employment Training Center, as well as Delaware North, Seneca One Tower,
  Riverworks, Catholic Charities and Catholic Heath.
- We have secured partnerships with 3 international high schools in Qatar to offer their students dual credit. The syllabi from these high schools matched 19 of our courses, which will be offered for dual credit beginning in February.
- Outlook for Domestic Dual Credit: We have almost doubled the number of participating high schools from 14 in Spring 2022 to 27 for this upcoming semester.
- In total for dual credit (domestic and international), we have partnerships established for 51 unique courses, and 89 total classes.

#### **Global Engagement**

• The Maurene Callahan Bouras Center for Global Engagement is dedicating much energy into international student enrollment, both recruitment and retention. Joy Guarino has been conversing

with Admissions, Marketing and Communications, and Financial Management to improve our communication, messaging, and processing for Gen Z international student recruitment.

- The spring 2023 new student enrollment numbers are 13 undergrads, 6 grads, 3 exchange, and 1 scholar. Tricia Herritt held a full day orientation for our new international students that shared information that is specific to them, including campus services and visa compliance.
- Melissa Holland is currently in India attending in-person recruitment fairs and meeting with our agents and potential students.
- The office is looking to diversify by developing brand recognition in new markets in Saudi Arabia and countries in Africa.
- Recent meetings with chairs of departments are informing how we promote the 'gems' of Buffalo State University and their specific programs that would be of particular interest to today's international student.

#### Honors

- M&T and Horizon Health mentoring program off to great start approximately 25 students with M&T Legal Division and Banking Services Division mentors, 7 students with Horizon Health. M&T will provide a seminar on Tech careers and the power of positive thinking in February and M&T and Horizon will collaborate on a careers panel discussion in April.
- Elizabeth Stevens, Senior Academic Advisor who manages all first year Honors advisement, received the President's Award for Excellence in Academic Advisement
- 16 Honors Peer Leaders mentored about 60 first year Honors students in the Fall 2022 semester helping them transition to college. They met with students in groups and one-on-one, sponsored activities, and held office hours for drop in help.
- Honors facilitated students to attend the fall Babel Literary Series talks at Kleinhans (Elizabeth Kolbert Under a White Sky on 10/14 and Omar El Akkad What Strange Paradise on 11/10/2022) and students in the first year and Senior seminar Honors courses read and discussed the books.

#### **Academic Advising**

- Monitoring registration of incoming fall 2022 students who have registered for the spring 2023 semester. So far, 792 are registered from the fall 2022 acknowledged report.
- Advisors are continuing to meet with students throughout the winter break to discuss academic standing concerns and last-minute course registrations.
- New spring student registration started on December 1, 2022. Registrations have been slow. There
  are currently only 38 incoming freshman eligible to register. There are 23/38 registered and
  another 8 with an upcoming registration appointment already scheduled in BSP. Advisors are
  conducting outreach via text, phone and email to schedule appointments with students as they
  become eligible.
- There are currently 85 transfer students eligible for registration. 56 have already been registered, either by the advisement office or self-registered. The advisement office and admissions office have been working closely to create a new process for advisement of transfer students.
- An updated advising plan for spring 2023 have been created and shared with other departments on campus, which includes professional advising expanding their advising responsibilities to not only freshman, but sophomores as well (including transfer students). Campuswide meetings have been taking place with the advisement center and various academic departments on campus to improve lines of communication and support the new advising process.

## **Student Success and Retention**

- To date Coaches have collectively conducted 383 unique 1:1 FY coaching sessions, with an average student return rate of 47.5%. They have also met with an additional 97 2<sup>nd</sup>/3<sup>rd</sup> yr students with an average return rate of 77%. (Please keep in mind these services are NOT mandated). 84% of students feel coaching is very helpful, 80% feel more connected to resources after a session, 64% feel more connected to the campus after a coaching session.
- We currently have 9 formal campus/community partnerships (Advising, School of Social Work, Student Conduct, UNC 100, Academic Standards, HESA, Tutoring, Financial Aid, and Harlem Children's Zone).
- We held 12 fall programs that connected with 486 students (avg 40 students/program). Programs are aimed at addressing 1 or more of the following areas (adding a new person to the student's network of support, assisting the student in defining their why, helping the student to create a plan for the first 3 semesters of college, connecting with a new resource).
- We held a student focus group in November that yielded a turnout of 105 students, the student feedback collected during this time is being presented during Winterim on 1/18/2.

- We are currently amid hosting several J-Term workshops which have focused on the following topics; Resolving Holds, Understanding Academic Appeals, What is Roar 2 Success, Preparing for Spring, Creative ways to fund your education, and Last call for registration. Many of these events have included campus collaborations from areas such as financial aid, advising, and academic standards.
- Collectively between 12/29/22-1/9/23 our team reviewed 175 academic appeal statements, where
  we provided proof reading and feedback to students to help them best prepare for the process.
  Additionally, we are working with the School of Arts and Sciences and UC studies to support
  approved dismissal appeal and probationary students this spring. These areas have created
  contracts with the students that require them to connect with their coach by specific deadlines
  throughout the spring.

#### FINANCE AND MANAGEMENT DIVISIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

## **Administrative Services**

Working with colleagues in IT, Financial Management, Facilities and Sponsored Programs, Administrative Services and Procurement Services are pleased to bring Jaggaer Digital Procurement Solution to Buffalo State. This software platform will replace the paper requisition and purchase order process with direct-to-vendor purchasing by buyers campus-wide. Approvals and workflow will be paperless and immediate, streamlining campus spend and increasing satisfaction while maintaining internal control and compliance. Currently, work is being done on the back end of the software to ensure a successful roll-out. The program will be brought in phases, starting with departments in Finance and Management. The balance of the campus is planned to be using Jaggaer within calendar year 2023.

#### Property Control

Buffalo State has been selected to serve as the pilot institution for the launch of a new surplus property sales web platform (similar to EBay). Upon completion of the pilot the program will be launched for all of SUNY. SUNY has been without an option to sell surplus property for over three years and this new program will aid in generating revenue.

## **Parking Services**

Parking Services has hired a new Associate Director who will bring extensive customer service and business process improvement.

#### NFTA

Buffalo State continues to negotiate a better deal for public transportation for our students. While an agreement has yet to be reached, the interim solution has resulted in a savings of approximately \$100K in the fall semester, over the contract proposed by NFTA.

#### **Emergency Response Planning**

Vice President for Finance and Management Laura Barnum continues to serve as Agency Executive, designated by the President, for campus emergency response. Additionally, the campus has hired an emergency manager, Tom Galluch, who now facilitates the campus response with the new public health taskforce which addresses all infectious disease risks. The following steps remain in place:

# Infectious Disease Daily Screening Questionnaire

Faculty and staff members are reminded via email to continue to monitor their personal health status and to report any symptomatic or positive case to their supervisors and Human Resource Management.

## Reporting Positive Cases and Monitoring Health

Any employee who receives a positive COVID-19 test result should report it to his or her supervisor and to Human Resource Management at <a href="https://hrc.ncbi.nlm

#### Surveillance Testing

Mandatory testing no longer required for students with a regular physical presence on campus. Rapid antigen take-home COVID tests are available at UPD, HR and Student Union for anyone who wants one. If a student is symptomatic a PCR test will be administered at the Weigel Health Center. Campuses are no longer required to report positive tests.

#### Masks

Masks are now optional for all members of the campus community, regardless of COVID-19 vaccination status. However, members of the campus community may choose to continue wearing a mask as a personal preference.

## Business Continuity Related To COVID-19

**Campus Operations.** The custodial emergency response team is trained and equipped with specialized disinfecting equipment and is available to address any area of concern, at any time of day, quickly and thoroughly. Custodial Services has resumed normal cleaning operations and is augmenting these with disinfection of high-touch surfaces in public areas.

The Environment Health and Safety Office provides educational guidance and personal protective equipment to help maintain a safe campus community in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

**Weather Emergency Events.** In November and December, the campus experienced two historic snow events that required an emergency response. Our campus saw significant snowfall, drifts, and other impacts – as did our entire region – and our facilities and custodial crews, along with Emergency Management, Administrative Operations and University Police, worked around the clock to ensure our campus was safe and accessible to return to normal operations at the beginning of the new year. Buffalo State also served as an operation center for the Emergency Transportation Operations of the New York State Department of Transportation (NYS DOT) and the National Guard, who helped with storm cleanup in the City of Buffalo. Additional resources were also provided by Buffalo State to Erie County and the City of Buffalo during the city's recovery efforts.

Buffalo State received assistance from SUNY Fredonia, SUNY Brockport, SUNY ESF, NYS DOT Emergency Transportation Operations, Chemung County, American Paving, and the Buffalo Psychiatric Center in our storm recovery on campus. We have also kindly received offers of assistance from SUNY Albany, SUNY Oswego, and others. Additionally, SUNY Emergency Management, New York State Emergency Management, and Erie County Emergency Management also aided our campus.

All things considered there was not significant damage. Upton roof, which was already under construction, Student Apartment Complex-exterior siding, Savage Hall-ceiling collapse, Power Plant emergency generator, HVAC equipment in various buildings as well as a few trees and debris on grounds.

## **Emergency Response Plan-Update**

The Buffalo State campus emergency plan has been rewritten and is currently it is in the second phase of reviews. After this review phase, the plan will be submitted to Cabinet and then to President for final approval. The next stage will update individual unit continuity of operations plans (COOPs) and train to those plans. Tom Galluch, Emergency Manager, has already begun some discussions with high profile areas on campus.

#### **Facilities**

## University Police and Campus Operations Center

Karner Hall (formerly Building 50) was built in the 1950s and acquired by the campus in 2003. It was constructed for manufacturing but has been used by Buffalo State as a storage facility. These 92,000 square foot building needs rehabilitation. This renovation will provide appropriately designed space to accommodate the University Police Department and the custodial, grounds, moving operations and property control and sustainable programs units; renovate warehouse and dock space to add much-needed storage for several departments; and create a better link to the main campus pedestrian spine and designated visitor parking areas. The completion of this project will make possible the re-use of Moore Hall for much-needed student life and dining functions.

The construction for Phase 1, which focuses on structural and utility systems improvements, is underway and will be complete in mid- November 2022. The construction of Phase 2, which will include interior renovations and fit-out for UPD offices, was bid and awarded.

#### Elms Hall

Elms Hall (formerly Classroom Building), built in 1972, retains most of its original systems and space configuration. These no longer meet the needs of our students and faculty.

This gut renovation project, estimated at \$78 million, will transform the building, providing modern classrooms and labs to meet the future teaching and learning needs of our students and academic departments. The building will have a spacious central entrance lobby, extending three stories, with generous student lounge and study space. A high-performance building enclosure and efficient lighting and HVAC systems will reduce the facility's carbon footprint and create the most energy-efficient building of its type on campus.

Phase 1 is under construction. This will include hazardous material abatement, full interior demolition, and the replacement of exterior facades. Phase 2 design is preparing documents for bid.

#### Full Interior Renovations, Ketchum Hall

Ketchum Hall was built in 1929 and last renovated in 1964. It houses 16 general purpose classrooms and 2 academic departments. The three-story building only has one set of toilet rooms on the ground floor level. Many interior finishes are original to the building. The mechanical and plumbing system are beyond their useful life. Assets Works has identified the HVAC equipment, distribution, and controls; telecom/data and BMS systems; ceilings/walls/doors/floors; lighting; electrical; and exterior doors are up for renewal in the next 5 years or less. Many of these systems are original to the building and making repairs has become difficult. A study has commenced for a full replacement of MEP systems, finishes, building and energy code upgrades, and programmatic reconfigurations. Once the study is complete in late spring, the project will move forward into design when funding is awarded.

#### Renovations for Permittee Use, Buckham Hall

The university is partnering with Buffalo Public Schools (BPS) for a study of Buckham Hall to determine the feasibility of using part of that building as the location for a public high school. The spaces considered for BPS will only be locations that are not occupied by Buffalo State University faculty, staff and students. Renovating vacant space will also benefit the University by providing a direct pipeline of high school students for recruitment to the university and actively facilitate access to public education, a core mission of the University.

The completed study, paid for by Buffalo Public Schools, considered programming and project concept, and a survey of existing conditions and probable costs for the project. It addresses New York State Education Department (NYSED) requirements and "aid ability," considering the potential for the project to proceed and receive funding.

The study is complete and once BPS submits to NYSED for a review, the university and Buffalo Public Schools will determine how best to move forward. Any resulting relationship with BPS would be guided by a agreements outlining terms, responsibilities, and costs.

## **Central Heating Plant Reconstruction**

The original boilers providing steam for heat and hot water to the campus have been idled and three new boilers are now operational. These new boilers will operate with improved efficiency, saving fuel cost and reducing carbon emissions. A final phase of this project will remove the remaining original boilers and replace the balance of plant equipment. This will increase efficiency and reliability and lengthen the lifespan for these critical systems.

## Replacement of Athletic and Recreation Field

A study was completed for the replacement of an athletic field that was lost due to the construction of the Science and Mathematics Complex. The first phase of this project is to construct an NCAA-compliant artificial turf field and amenities for intercollegiate athletics, recreation, and intramurals. The consultant has been hired and the design has commenced. Subsequent phases will construct a concession and restroom facility, storage building, pedestrian zone for game-day activities and merchandising, and relocated softball diamond and amenities. Funding has not been identified for the future phases.

## Renovation of Moore Hall for Student Life

As confirmed in the Housing Master Plan, a study was completed for Moore Hail to return the building to student life. It was determined through the study that spaces for multi-purpose programming/assembly space, food service, lounge space, and Moore Complex residential offices. The project is for all students, not just those living in Moore Complex and the Towers. The consultant has been hired and the design has commenced. Construction of Moore Hall is contingent upon Karner Hall construction is being completed.

#### Bengal Walk and Social Justice Project

Bengal Walk is the main pedestrian spine from the center of campus west to Grant Street. It was completed in 1997. Since its completion in 1997, surfaces and utilities have deteriorated beyond repair and trees have been lost to ash bore infestation. This project will reconstruct the walkway, including improvements to hardscape, softscape, lighting and seating. Bengal Walk has been chosen as the location for the President's outdoor social justice initiative. Along this walk Buffalo State's past, present, and future social justice history will be displayed. The design of the project has commenced, and construction is expected to start in late spring 2023.

#### Reconstruct Parking Lots R-12 & R-13L

This critical maintenance project will remediate the poor condition of the paved areas, site lighting and drainage in parking lots R-12 and R-13. Modern LED lighting will be added, reducing maintenance and utility costs. This will be a large-scale renovation, requiring trenching throughout the two parking lots. Design is underway.

#### **Financial Operations**

Financial Operations has facilitated priority #7 Workforce Planning project as part of the President's Financial Sustainability Plan. The scope of the project is to review all state funding sources with primary review of the revenue off-set fund (core operating budget) and secondary review of dormitory (DIFR), Income Fund Reimbursable (IFR) and state university tuition reimbursable (SUTRA). Deliverables include analysis of key performance indicators to inform future hiring decisions; position management process review and redesign to utilize the SRPP to manage all positions through an annual review cycle; and identify efficiencies through the review of all roles and management structures for potential savings, reduction of risk and errors and ultimately investment in value added activities.

## **Financial Management Office**

#### Strategic Resource Planning Process

The process began in October with internal compilation of data and templates. Workbooks were distributed to divisions in November and submitted to Financial Management in January. Since submission, data was compiled and analyzed. All fee requests and increases were analyzed and moved beginning at the end of January. All course-based fee requests were successfully compiled, analyzed, and approved internally and were submitted to SUNY before the May 1st deadline. Broad-based fees were also compiled, analyzed, and presented in an extremely tight timeframe while also making enhancements to the process. Meetings with each VP/Decanal unit in addition to with the University Senate Budget, Staffing and Allocations Committee will commence in March.

#### Broad-Based Fee process was enhanced:

- a. Created a recorded presentation with all fee custodians
- b. Created a five-question survey for student feedback
- c. Created a summary update of communications and enhancements which was shared with BSAC and Student Welfare Committee

#### **Student Accounts Office**

#### Check Readers

Student Accounts obtained two check readers to allow for remote deposit. This allows for timely verification of funds. The check readers allow for daily real-time deposits to our financial institution, allows more streamlined data reports, and lessens the cost to the university for armored services due to the significantly lower amounts of deposits needing to be transferred.

## Staffing

Two SL-2 Student Accounts Specialists were hired in the fall to assist in the supervision of workflow in the Student Accounts Office. These positions will oversee the tuition collection of delinquent accounts, the present payment plan module, and implementation of a formal past due payment plan for accuracy and compliance aimed at helping our students achieve success in their university career and pursue higher education affordably. In addition, these positions will manage the disbursement of aid and daily bill processes, be responsible for the oversight of the front-end cash management and proposed eCommerce programs, and the proposed process receipt of Foundation cash flow.

#### Information Technology

Information Technology is engaged in several projects to improve health and safety, enhance the student experience, and improve communications for campus constituents. Below are a highlighted few:

## Cybersecurity Training & Compliance for faculty/staff

Biannual updated videos selected to be reviewed by all staff and faculty. Availability of training materials to be put at an easy to access address (https://infosec.buffalostate.edu which points to the Information Security Knowledge Base section of TeamDynamix).

#### Deployment of integration between Banner and Brightspace

As part of the move from Blackboard to Brightspace, IT staff were tasked to deploy the integration between Banner and Brightspace, work that involved integration to a multi-tenant environment (SUNY schools are or will be using Brightspace as their distance learning platform in a shared environment). The shared platform will allow for enhanced services for online students, particularly those who are or would be enrolled in online courses for multiple SUNY institutions.

## Opt-out emergency notification processing

Working with Omnilert, the university has now moved to an 'opt-out' model for emergency notification for students, where students will receive emergency email and text information until and unless a student opts out of the service. This will enhance campus safety for students and provides for a better overall experience when emergency notifications are received.

#### **Access Control and Security Camera enhancements**

Several new and upgraded exterior security cameras were installed across the campus to enhance the visibility that University Police have when investigating incidents on campus. Additional cameras are being installed currently in Neumann and Bengal Halls. Planning is also underway to migrate all exterior doors in the Residence Halls to the RS2 access control system.

## **Student Email Migration**

a successful pilot was completed for the migration of student email accounts from Google to Microsoft 365. Newly accepted students for the Fall 2023 semester will have email accounts only in Microsoft 365 and existing student email accounts will be migrated to Microsoft 365 during the summer of 2023

#### **Dining Services Kiosks**

New self-service kiosks will be installed over the winter break in the Student Union to enhance the ordering process. Additional data wiring is being installed to accommodate these new kiosks as well as order processing displays and printers.

## Visix Upgrade

The campus digital signage system was upgraded to the latest version of the Visix software to provide a refreshed interface and new hardware. The new system will also update the wayfinding displays located in Technology, SAMC and Houston Gym.

# Gradescope Implementation (and retirement of Scantron)

New cloud based self-service test scoring and analysis system Gradescope was implemented to replace the end-of-life Scantron test scoring system. This new system allows faculty to administer several types of paper-based assessments and use the powerful AI system to do automated scoring and provide analysis. There is direct integration with the campus Course Management System (CMS).

## **Sponsored Program Administration**

The Buffalo State Sponsored Programs Office was awarded the Partnership Excellence Award at the Research Foundation's recent system wide symposium. The Partnership Excellence award recognizes outstanding teamwork and celebrates the spirit of performance excellence within departments and between units.





Projected High School Graduates

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

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

# RESOLUTION

At its February 7, 2023 meeting, the SUNY Buffalo State Council recommended; and President Conway-Turner approved; that the Bengal Stripes Global Learning Lab (Campbell Student Union 419) be renamed the "Donn Youngstrom AFP Global Learning Lab" in honor of Mr. Donn M. Youngstrom.

Mr. Donn Youngstrom joined the faculty at Buffalo State in 1994 following an extensive theatrical career. After receiving a bachelor's degree in history from Lewis & Clark College, he studied acting at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts/West. He began his career acting and directing in semi-professional theaters in LA and later Seattle. He relocated to New York City, where he joined CSC Rep, a classical repertory company. In 1984 he played the lead in *Comus* directed by Donald Savage as part of a Milton Festival at Buffalo State. There he met Donna and Dennis McCarthy, as well as Horace (Hank) Mann.

At the urging of Dr. Savage and Dr. Mann, Mr. Youngstrom completed a master's in fine arts in directing at Brooklyn College. He subsequently taught as a Lecturer at East Carolina University for four years before returning to New York City as an adjunct professor. In 1994 he was invited by the Chair of the Theater Department, Donna McCarthy, to return to Buffalo State, this time initially as a full-time temporary faculty and later tenured faculty member. Mr. Youngstrom retired in 2018.

As a member of the Buffalo State faculty, Mr. Youngstrom left a lasting impression on countless students, in his classes and as a director of 22 student productions. He served as chair of the Theater Department and was a member of the Faculty Senate. He has also been a long-time member of the Anne Frank Project advisory board.

This honor is given in consideration of a gifts made to Buffalo State by **Mr. Donn**Youngstrom and in recognition of his many years of service as a member of the SUNY Buffalo State community.

### Facilities Committee Report to the College Council

The Facilities Committee of the College Council met on November 10, 2022, to review progress on the following projects:

### Capital Budget

VP Barnum reviewed the status of the currently enacted 2022-23 capital budget:

- The 2022-23 enacted capital budget included \$650 million allocated to SUNY for its campuses for both criterial maintenance and new
  construction projects. Of the \$650 million, \$64.1 million was allocated to the College for new construction and critical maintenance projects.
   Critical Maintenance
- Mr. Wittmer reported that at the end of this fiscal year, the college will hit a benchmark of between \$750,000 and \$1 million worth of minor and critical maintenance projects, which he noted is a significant increase from few years ago.

# Projects in Planning and Design during Fall 2022 Mechanical Systems Upgrade at Butler Library The air distribution system in Butler Library, originally built into cavities in the floor slabs, needs to be replaced. This project will provide new ductwork, controls, and HVAC hot water piping needed to correct the system. Design is underway. Rehabilitation of Ketchum Hall Ketchum Hall is one of the five original campus buildings built in 1929. Its last major renovation was in 1964. Ketchum Hall has been prioritized as the next major building renovation after Elms Hall (Classroom Building) is complete. To start the process, the campus will conduct a study, through concept design, for a full building renovation. The study will include a building systems assessment with options for replacement, space program, concept layout, opinion of probable cost, and schedule. Renovation of Moore Hall for Student Services Moore Hall was built as a dining hall to serve Moore Complex and the Towers. Currently the building is being used by the custodial services and property control and sustainable programs offices, which will relocate to the University Police and Campus Operations Center (Building 50) once that facility is renovated. The facility and housing master plans indicate that Moore Hall should be returned to student life use. The campus has performed a program study to determine the best uses for this building. These may include, but are not limited to, food service, multipurpose programming space, lounge space, and a convenience store. Design is underway. Replacement NCAA and Recreation Field During construction of the Science and Math Complex, the campus gave up an outdoor competition field temporarily. Buffalo State has recently conducted a comprehensive study to determine the best location for the NCAA-regulation replacement field. The broader objective of the study was to envision a destination outdoor athletic and recreation complex. Phase 1 construction will replace the lost field. It will include a scoreboard, sound system and lighting. Design is underway.



This project has been paused to align with the <u>Region Central process</u> led by the Greater Buffalo Niagara Regional Transportation Council (GBNRTC). Although no plans have been endorsed by either the City of Buffalo or Buffalo State College and no funding has been identified at this time, we look forward to continued engagement with the campus, local community, and stakeholders and alignment with the Region Central process.



## Civic and Community Engagement Center



Originally an attendants' home at the Buffalo Psychiatric Center, NYS Office of Mental Health Building 15 is currently mothballed. Ideally located near Rockwell Road and the Burchfield Penney Art Center, it is envisioned as the future home of Buffalo State's Civic and Community Engagement Center.

The college has developed a business case and program scope for the civic and community engagement building concept; the next step is to determine how the concept would fit in Building 15. A study will determine project scope and costs for renovations.



## Parking Study

The most recent comprehensive Buffalo State parking study was completed during the facilities master plan process of 2010. The campus has begun a parking study to assess current and future needs. It will include an operational assessment and recommendations and will consider impacts from adjacent neighbors.



### Reconstruction of Parking Lots R-12 and R-13

This critical maintenance project will remediate the poor condition of the paved areas, site lighting and drainage in parking lots R-12 and R-13. Modern LED lighting will be added, reducing maintenance and utility costs. This will be a large-scale renovation, requiring trenching throughout the two parking lots. Design is underway.





## Elms Hall (Classroom Building)

Elms Hall, built in 1972, retains most of its original systems and space configuration. These no longer meet the needs of our students and faculty. All occupants have been relocated to Cassety or Buckham halls to allow renovations to proceed.

This gut renovation project, estimated at \$78 million, will transform the building and provide modern classrooms and labs to meet the future teaching and learning needs of our students and academic departments. The building will have a spacious central entrance lobby, extending three stories, with generous student lounge and study space. A high-performance building enclosure and efficient lighting and HVAC systems will reduce the building's carbon footprint and create the most energy efficient building of its type on campus. The project was divided into two phases. Phase 1 includes demolition, hazardous


material removal, and replacement of exterior envelope. Phase 2 is the entire interior and MEP fit out and site work. Phase 1 is in construction and phase 2 design is in process.



## Karner Hall (Building 50/University Police and Campus Operations Center)

Karner Hall was built in the 1950s and acquired by the campus in 2003. It was constructed for manufacturing but has been used by Buffalo State as a storage facility. This 92,000 square foot building is in great need of rehabilitation.

This renovation will provide appropriately designed space to accommodate the University Police Department and the custodial, grounds, moving operations and property control and sustainable programs units; renovate warehouse and dock space to add much-needed storage for several departments; and create a better link to the main campus pedestrian spine and designated visitor parking areas. The completion of this \$14.8 million project will make possible the reuse of Moore Hall for much-needed student life and dining functions. Phase 1 construction is near completion and phase 2 is getting ready to bid.



### Central Heating Plant Reconstruction, Phases 1, 2 and 3

Buffalo State's steam plant is at the end of its life cycle. This project is replacing boilers and associated equipment with new and more efficient versions. This will save costs for fuel, operation, and maintenance; reduce harmful emissions and potential for harmful fuel leaks; and provide a more reliable source of heat and hot water for the campus. Underground fuel oil tanks will be removed in favor of natural gas for fuel.
