CALL TO ORDER

The Chair called the meeting to order at 4:01 p.m. The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting and thanked all attending in person and remotely. The Chair welcomed two additions to our Council: Gary Siddal and DJ Hardwick. Each member introduced themselves.

CHAIR'S REPORT

The Chair announced that the Council committees were reconstructed by the Chair based on input from Interim President Durand and Council Secretary Burke to bring them into alignment with education law and ACT guidelines, effective as of September 6, 2023. The reason for this was to enhance the effectiveness of the Council's work. The purpose of this restructuring and creation of new committees and merging of functions of the old is to make the Council stronger and to improve collaboration. Current committees now encompass:

Budget, Citizens Advisory, Facilities, Government Relations, Naming of Buildings and Grounds, Nominated and Presidential Appointment Advisories, Strategic Initiatives, Student Life – includes Student Conduct and Safety.

Descriptions, membership, and administrative staff of each committee can be found on the Buffalo State University Council website. It was mentioned that Buffalo State University's future relies heavily on our shared governance structure. This restructuring aims to establish a solid foundation for a mutually beneficial relationship with the interim administration. It also sets clear expectations for the future permanent President regarding the relationship between the Council and the administration.

ACTION ITEMS

The Chair called for a motion to approve the minutes from the April 11, 2023, meeting. Mr. Zak moved that the minutes be approved; the motion was seconded by Ms. Farrell. The motion carried by unanimous vote.

Must learn to work together. Servicing our students is the focus. A second campus

climate survey will be sent out to the campus in spring of 2024.

Our budget situation and SUNY's expectations of Buffalo State were discussed. Buffalo State's enrollment was reviewed. Buffalo State's Middle States accreditation has been approved. Buffalo State's graduate office is being restructured. Each Council member's packet has the President's state of the university speech. If there are any questions, Interim President Durand is open to hear them. The Buffalo State community is strong and will work hard to keep this steady course. Report concluded (see attached).

President's Report to the Buffalo State University Council

Introduction

Instead, I took the liberty of providing a different type of report, due to the state of transition we find ourselves in. This report amalgamates key remarks I have delivered since my tenure began, outlining our strategic objectives, and the pivotal roles we all play in realizing these goals. It also contains highlights of the previous year, a summary of the current state of the university, as well as my vision for its future, and a collective call-toaction.

As we chart the course of the new academic year, our focus rests on the transformational power we wield, not just within the President's Office or its occupant, but across the entire Buffalo State community. Our faculty, administrative, professional, and clerical staff are the lifeblood of our institution, upholding our mission through teaching, researching, grant writing, and curriculum development. This body has a special statutory role in the shared governance of Buffalo State University, and therefore, the future of our beloved institution. I am working very closely with Chair Dobmeier to ensure that the Council has the right structure and information to fulfil its obligations effectively and efficiently. The progress we have made in the past few months is a testament to the collective strength, wisdom, and dedication of our college community.

Strategic Priorities

As we stepped into this academic year, I spoke at the <u>Faculty and Academic Staff Kick-Off</u>, were I urged each one member of the faculty and academic staff to embody authentic leadership, characterized by influence and impact. I implored them that with a renewed sense of purpose and commitment to our strategic outcomes, we can transform Buffalo State University into an epitome of academic excellence, a hub of innovation, and a testament to the transformative power of higher education.

Remarks at the Opening Buffalo State Senate Meeting

2023 Highlights

The university also implemented cost-saving measures, such as training a staff member to service sewing machines across three departments, resulting in significant savings.

Institutional Achievements. The university celebrated the conferring of degrees on nearly 1,300 undergraduate and over 500 graduate students at the 151st Commencement celebration. Highlighting the institution's commitment to excellence, Buffalo State University received commendation from the Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE) and the continuation of accreditation for the graduate education program in speech-language pathology by the Council on Academic Accreditation in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology (CAA). The Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE) reaccreditation efforts have been a hallmark achievement, shining a positive light on Buffalo State and reflecting each community members' commitment to educational excellence and quality assurance. I was informed that the Middle States Site Visiting Committee spoke highly of the commitment of the Council who attended in its entirety the session on governance. I extend my deepest gratitude to everyone for your unwavering dedication to this endeavor for excellence.



RESOLUTION

At its October 3, 2023 meeting, the Buffalo State College Council recommended, and Interim President Bonita R. Durand approved, that the **Dr. Katherine Conway-Turner Office of Civil and Community Engagement** be named in her honor.

Katherine S. Conway-Turner, Ph.D., began her tenure as the ninth president of Buffalo State on August 3, 2014. Her professional leadership can be seen in the many and varied aspects that are part of a major academic anchor institution. Dr. Conway-Turner oversees and manages more than 1,500 faculty, staff, and administrators who provide more than 75 undergraduate and 60 graduate academic degree programs to 6,500 undergraduate and 1,000 graduate students each year. President Conway-Turner's vision for Buffalo State to become "Buffalo's College" through engagement, excellence, and social responsibility has been embraced and is paying off in dividends for both the college and the community including garnering significant philanthropic support for the institution.

Buffalo State's commitment to service has been recognized nationally under President Conway-Turner's leadership. In 2016, Buffalo State was among five colleges and universities from across the country chosen to share in the Washington Center's annual Higher Education Civic Engagement Awards. The college has also earned the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching's Community Engagement Classification under Dr. Conway-Turner, as well as accolades from the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll and recognition of excellence from AASCU.

One of President Conway-Turner's signature events, "Bengals Dare to Care Day," was initiated as part of her inauguration week of activities in 2014, and she officially launched the annual service day the following year. Buffalo State students, faculty, alumni, staff, and friends of the college provide community service within the City of Buffalo one Saturday during the fall semester. Each year hundreds of the Buffalo State community members provide service to 40 community agencies throughout the city.

Dr. Conway-Turner also lends her talent and time to several boards, committees, and programs nationally, statewide, and locally. She serves on the Distinguished Alumnus Award Search and Selection Committee for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, and she is a member of the Association of American Colleges and Universities' Presidents' Trust. She is also a member of the review and selection panel for the American Council on Education Fellows Program, and she is a member of the Division III President's Council, a member of NCAA Board of Governors Committee to Promote Cultural Diversity and Equity and Pathway Program mentor for the National Collegiate Athletic Association. President Conway-Turner is the vice chair and commissioner for the Middle States Commission on Higher Education, which is the

accrediting body for higher education institutions in Delaware, the District of Columbia, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. She is the vice chair of the board of Campus Compact and member of the executive board of the Coalition of Urban and Metropolitan Universities (CUMU).

Her statewide commitments include service on the Western New York Youth Apprenticeship steering committee. From 2004 to 2009, she was provost and vice president for academic affairs at SUNY Geneseo. Dr. Conway-Turner was the dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Social Sciences at Georgia Southern University and associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at the University of Delaware, where she also served as director of the women's studies program and graduate program coordinator. She was an American Council on Education (ACE) fellow at the College of New Jersey, and she has held teaching positions at University of Delaware, Santa Clara University and California State University, Long Beach.

President Conway-Turner's personal journey mirrors that of many of her students, past and present. As a first-generation college student, she appreciates the process of education and embraces its transformative aspects. She listens to the ever-changing needs of her students and attempts to implement and monitor new programs and processes to help these students become successful, contributing members of society.

She has also become known on campus and in the community for her social media outreach, including blog posts, tweets, and Instagram posts that highlight activities occurring on campus, as well as many of her humanitarian efforts.

Dr. Conway-Turner is married to Dr. Alvin L. Turner, a psychologist licensed in New York and Delaware, who is engaged in the independent practice of psychotherapy, supervision, training, and forensic psychological services.

Gordon shared that fall 2023 housing occupancy is 13.3% higher than last year with over 1900 residential Students.

Brooks shared information regarding Journey to success program that focuses on proactively engaging students 3vents, activities and experiences based on their place on their path in their time at Buffalo State.
